
Therefore, it is my honor to dedicate this year's Fair book to Lion Pat Daigle.

to Lion Bill Allread





One of the longest-serving members of the Terryville Lions Club is Lion Bill Allread. A Michigan native, he moved to Terryville and started a powdered-metal fabricating company in the old Eagle Lock Company building on the corner of South Main and East Orchard Street, which he continues to run.

Lion Bill is a veteran of the United States Navy Submarine Service. He continues his patriotic duties here in town every Memorial Day; setting up the lectern and public address systems for the services in Plymouth and Terryville.

Mr. Allread joined the Terryville Lions Club in February, 1970, which makes him a 53-year member. He has held all major offices in the club,

and became its president in 1985. Under the old plan, he was chairman of the Terryville Country Fair during September of the year following the end of his presidency. Bill was active in Connecticut Lions District 23-B as well, rising up to the high office of Deputy District Governor (Now known as Vice District Governor). Business responsibilities prevented him from seeking the District Governor's position, but it is believed that he would have made a good one.

Lion Bill has been active in town affairs, most recently as chairman of the Building Committee for the new High School.

An ever-present worker at the Terryville Fair-grounds, usually up high in his "bucket", Bill can be seen pulling electric and communications cables; hanging lights and loudspeakers around the fairgrounds and in general just "being there" for anybody who needs help or advice. At club meetings, he was always the one to "move" for adjournment. When we were all more active and traveling to other clubs and District events, wait staff had to be told that Bill didn't eat chicken. Maybe he'd had too much of it on the submarine?

Aside from all these accomplishments, Bill Allread is a fine woodworker; having built some of the furniture in his own house, and also makes some fine-tasting wine from the line of grape vines outside his factory.

Lion Bill has two daughters. His wife Leona passed away several years ago, and he has moved into an apartment in another old Eagle Lock shop across from his business.

Bill is one of the last of the "old school" Lions Club members who even today remains an active and well-respected Lion. The Terryville Lions Club proudly dedicates this yearbook to Lion William Allread; past Deputy District Governor.



- 1. The Terryville Country Fair will assume no responsibility for any loss or damage to any exhibits.
- 2. All entries must be received by the appropriate person by the specified date listed on the entry forms.
- 3. All exhibits must be on the grounds and ready for judging as specified for each department. LATE ENTRIES WILL NOT BE JUDGED.
- 4. Exhibitor tags will be mailed to the exhibitor in advance of the Fair. Tags not received must be picked up at the Secretary's office before 6 p.m. Thursday evening. All exhibit tags must be properly attached to the exhibits, except photography, Dept. X.
- 5. Entry fees are not required in any exhibit class, except where noted.
- 6. In fairness to all exhibitors the Terryville Country Fair will not pay a premium on items not listed in the department classes.
- 7. Exhibits must be left on the grounds for all Fair days. Security will be on duty to protect the exhibits. They must be removed on Sunday at 6:00 p.m.
- 8. Any exhibitors interfering with the judges while they execute their duties may be excluded from competition.
- 9. The judges reserve the right to award no prize, or a second, or a third prize only in classes where the entries do not justify a higher award. When there is no competition in any one class, but one entry, a prize worthy of the entry will be given.
- 10. Any protest regarding prizes for exhibits must be made in writing to the Fair Secretary within five days from the last day of the Fair.

GENERAL NOTICES

- 1. All cattle and horse trucks and trailers must use truck entrance.
- 2. No concessionaire or exhibitor vehicles will be allowed on the Fair-grounds after 10:00 a.m. on fair days.
- 3. No alcoholic beverages are allowed to be brought onto the Fairgrounds.
- 4. The use of propane gas by concessionaires must be approved by the superintendent of grounds concessions. Tanks will be subject to inspection before use.
- 5. Dogs and pets are NOT ALLOWED on the grounds.
- 6. Distribution of literature or materials by vendors, organizations, groups or individuals is restricted to assigned space on the grounds.

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A. GENERAL REQUIREMENTS:

- Health certificates signed by an accredited veterinarian and other required testing will be valid for the entire 2023 show season. If travelling to multiple New England States for exhibition, see the Memorandum Livestock Health Certificates for the 2023 Show Season, for additional requirements.
- 2. All animals and poultry entered at fairs and shows must be in good health and in proper physical condition and will be examined at the exhibition by the barn superintendent. Evidence of poor condition or infectious or contagious disease or failure to produce the necessary documents for health certification, vaccination or testing will result in ejection. The Connecticut Department of Agriculture Livestock Inspector's decision is final.
- 3. Health charts and proof of vaccination where applicable are the responsibility of the exhibitor.
- 4. Each barn superintendent will collect and hold the Health Certificates from each exhibitor. Animals not in compliance with the state regulations for shows and fairs will not be allowed. A complete list, containing the name of the exhibitor, address, animal ID (ear tag, tattoo, leg band), breed and age of each animal, and the total head count will be made available to the State Livestock Inspector and forwarded to the Connecticut Department of Agriculture, Bureau of Regulatory Services by the fair superintendent. All animals and poultry present on the grounds should be identified on this list. Any animal that is rejected should be noted as such with a brief statement of reason. Rejected animals or poultry should be removed from the grounds as soon as possible. Any concerns about the health of any animal or bird should be reported to the State Livestock Inspector or the Fair Veterinarian immediately.
- 5. Isolate all exhibited animals and poultry upon their return to the farm from other animals and poultry for 3-4 weeks to reduce the risk of disease exposure and transmission. Call your local veterinarian if your animals or poultry become sick to help you with diagnosis and treatment.
- 6. Contact the Bureau of Regulatory Services at 860-713-2504 if you have any questions.

B. CONNECTICUT ANIMALS

***All cattle, horses and sheep must have a rabies vaccination given by a licensed veterinarian. The vaccination certificate must be signed by the veterinarian that gave the vaccination and include the animal's identification and description, the name of the vaccine's manufacturer, serial number and the date the vaccination was given and when it expires. If it is the animal's

first rabies vaccination, it must be given at least 30 DAYS prior to their first show date to be considered current.***

- 1. ALL SPECIES: Animals must originate from herds or flocks that meet the testing and health requirements of the State of Connecticut. State livestock inspectors may request proof of compliance with state requirements. No herd or flock under quarantine order shall move or be exhibited. All animals must have permanent identification (ear tag, tattoo, leg band, microchip plus a reader or EIA certificate).
- 2. CATTLE: All cattle must have a health certificate issued within 60 days of their first show by an accredited veterinarian stating that the animal is in good health and not showing signs of infectious, contagious and/or communicable diseases.
- 3. HORSES: All horses must have a negative AGID (Coggins) or ELISA test for Equine Infectious Anemia (EIA) within 12 months of their show date and be accompanied by this certificate. It is highly recommended that horses be vaccinated against EEE & WNV within 6 months of their first show date.
- 4. SHEEP: All sheep must have official USDA-approved identification and be accompanied by health certificates issued within 60 days of their first show by an accredited veterinarian stating that the sheep are in good health and not showing signs of infectious, contagious and/or communicable diseases and are not from Scrapie-exposed flocks.
- 5. GOATS: All goats must have official USDA-approved identification and a health certificate issued within 60 days of their first show by an accredited veterinarian stating that the animals are in good health and not showing signs of infectious, contagious and/or communicable diseases and are not from Scrapie-exposed herds.
- 6. SWINE: All swine must originate from Connecticut herds that are tested for Brucellosis and Pseudorabies on a yearly basis. All swine must have a health certificate issued within 60 days prior to the first show by an accredited veterinarian. If the swine are purchased from a tested herd, a bill of sale from the Connecticut producer must be presented to the State Veterinarian's office before a Connecticut Exhibition Test card will be issued to the new owner.
- 7. POULTRY: Poultry originating within the state must come from healthy flocks with no evidence of infectious, contagious and/or communicable diseases. All birds must be inspected, identified and be accompanied by written proof (Connecticut Flock Test card or Connecticut Veterinary Medical Diagnostic Laboratory Report) that verifies that the breeding flock or the individual birds listed on the report were blood-test negative for Salmonella pullorum within 365 days of the show date. Concurrent Avian Influenza testing of the flock and/or individual birds is strongly recommended. Poultry vaccinated within 30 days with any live virus vaccine will be prohibited from showing. All cages, crates or vehicles used for housing or transporting poultry must be cleaned and disinfected before and after each show. **Doves**, pigeons and waterfowl are exempt from testing requirements, but must be identified by leg bands or wing tags.
- 8. LLAMAS & ALPACAS: Llamas and alpacas that originate within the state must have a health certificate issued within 60 days of the first show by an accredited veterinarian listing the permanent identification (ear tag, tattoo or microchip and a reader must be available for the microchip) and stating the animal is in good health and free of obvious signs of infectious disease.

C. OUT OF STATE ANIMALS:

***All cattle, horses and sheep must have a rabies vaccination given by a licensed veterinarian. The vaccination certificate must be signed by the veterinarian that gave the vaccination and include the animal's identification and description, the name of the vaccine's manufacturer, serial number and the date the vaccination was given and when it expires. If it is the animal's first rabies vaccination, it must be given

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at least 30 DAYS prior to their first show date.***



1. ALL SPECIES: Animals shall originate from herds or flocks that meet the testing and health requirements

of the State of Connecticut and must be accompanied by health certificates and test charts as indicated below. No animals from a herd or flock under quarantine order shall enter into the State. All animals and poultry must have official permanent identification (ear tag, tattoo, leg band, wing band, microchip plus a reader, or EIA certificate). All animals and birds (except horses) must have an exhibition permit number on the health certificates. Call 860-713-2504 or 860-713-2508 for a permit number. All out of state animals and birds offered for sale must meet **Connecticut Importation Regulations**.

- 2. CATTLE: All cattle must have health certificates issued within 30 days of the first show by an accredited veterinarian, test charts and vaccination certificates where applicable. All cattle must have a negative TB test within 12 months of the show date. Cattle under 6 months of age may go on the dam's TB test chart if the dam was tested for TB within the past 12 months and a copy of the results is provided. All Brucellosis vaccinated female cattle over 18 months of age and all bulls and non-vaccinated female cattle 6 months of age and older must have a negative Brucellosis test within 12 months of the show date. Steers and spayed heifers are exempt from Brucellosis testing.
- 3. HORSES: All horses must have a health certificate issued within 30 days of their first show date by an accredited veterinarian. All horses must have a negative AGID (Coggins) or ELISA test for Equine Infectious Anemia (EIA) within 12 months of the show date and be accompanied by this certificate. It is highly recommended that horses be vaccinated against EEE & WNV within 6 months of the first show date.
- 4. SHEEP: All sheep must have official USDA-approved identification and be accompanied by health certificates issued within 30 days of their first show date by an accredited veterinarian stating that the sheep are in good health and not showing signs of infectious, contagious and/or communicable diseases and are not from Scrapie-exposed flocks.
- 5. GOATS: All goats must have official USDA-approved identification and be accompanied by a health certificate issued within 30 days of their first show date by an accredited veterinarian stating that the goats are in good health and not showing signs of infectious, contagious and/or communicable diseases and are not from Scrapie-exposed flocks. All goats must originate from Brucellosis and TB free herds. Goats 3 months old and over must test negative to TB and Brucellosis within 12 months of the show date. Kids under 3 months of age may go on the dam's test chart if the dam was tested within the past 12 months and a copy of the results is provided. Wethers are exempt from Brucellosis testing.
- 6. SWINE: Swine that are 3 months of age and older must be negative to Brucellosis and Pseudorabies tests and have a health certificate stating such within 30 days of their first show date by an accredited veterinarian. Barrows are exempt from Brucellosis testing but must have a negative Pseudorabies test. Swine under 3 months of age must originate from a Brucellosis-free and Pseudorabies qualified herd and the herd test dates and qualified herd numbers must be on the health certificate.
- 7. POULTRY: All poultry must be identified and test negative for Salmonella pullorum within 12 months of the show date and be accompanied by this certificate. All poultry must comply with the Department of Agriculture Avian Influenza requirements by originating from Al-Free flocks or be tested for Al within 30 days of entry and have a certificate. No poultry from any areas of any state having Avian Influenza may enter Connecticut. Poultry vaccinated within 30 days with any live virus vaccine will be prohibited from showing. All cages, crates and vehicles used for housing and transporting poultry must be cleaned and disinfected before and after each show. **Doves, pigeons and waterfowl are exempt from testing requirements, but must be identified by leg bands or wing tags.**

8. LLAMAS & ALPACAS: All llamas and alpacas must have a negative Axillary TB test within 12 months and a negative Brucellosis test within 12 months of

entry, and a health certificate issued within 30 days of the first show by an accredited veterinarian, listing the permanent identification (ear tag, tattoo or microchip and a reader must be available for the microchip) and test results..

IMPORTANT NOTICE

*******All animals for which there is a licensed Rabies vaccine – cattle, horses, sheep, dogs, cats and ferrets-exposed to the public shall be vaccinated against Rabies. Animals not having an approved Rabies vaccination shall be displayed in a manner such that the public would not be in contact or exposed to saliva from those animals and have EASILY VISIBLE POSTED SIGNS OR TAPE stating, "CONNECTICUT RABIES ADVISORY NOTICE - DO NOT FEED OR TOUCH ANIMALS".***

On August 4, 2009, the Department of Agriculture adopted regulations for the "Control of Rabies in Public Settings" which will be enforced at all Connecticut fairs and public exhibitions. The complete text of the regulations, RCSA §§ 22-359-1 through 22-359-5, follows this notice. Its provisions include the following for both Connecticut and out of state animals:

(1) Animals for which there is a licensed Rabies vaccine

- Horses, cattle, sheep, dogs and cats must be currently vaccinated against rabies by a licensed veterinarian unless they are under the minimum age to be vaccinated. (Ferrets are also included in this category if displayed.)
- These animals must have a rabies vaccination certificate signed by the licensed veterinarian administering the vaccine that includes the animal's identification and description, name and address of owner, name of the vaccine's manufacturer, serial number, date the vaccination was administered and date when it expires.
- If it is the animal's first vaccination, it must be given at least **30 days** prior to the first show date to be considered current.

(2) Animals not having an approved Rabies vaccination

- Includes animals for which there is not a licensed rabies vaccine and animals for which there is a licensed rabies vaccine but are under the age to be vaccinated. (Most rabies vaccines are labeled to be administered when animals reach 3 months of age young animals for exhibition should be vaccinated as soon as possible after 3 months of age.)
- Animals must be separated from the public by sufficient means to avoid direct contact with people and other animals, such as a double fence, plexiglass, or other means; or conspicuous signs or tape must be posted near the animal enclosure stating "CONNECTICUT RABIES ADVISORY NOTICE – DO NOT FEED OR TOUCH ANIMALS".

Yellow tape with the rabies advisory notice wording is available for purchase from the Department of Agriculture.

Regulations of Connecticut State Agencies Control of Rabies in Public Settings

Section 22-359-1 Definitions.

As used in Sections 22-359-1 to 22-359-5, inclusive, of the Regulations of Connecticut State Agencies:

- (1) "Animal" means any warm blooded creatures, including bats.
- (2) "Commissioner" means the Commissioner of Agriculture or the

Commissioner's designated agent.



(3) "Controlled situation" means a public setting in which an animal is under the control of a handler and persons having direct physical contact with such animal can be

and persons having direct physical contact with such animal can be readily identified and contacted if a rabies exposure incident occurs.

- (4) "Currently vaccinated" means an animal was vaccinated against rabies and is considered immunized based on administration of the primary vaccination at least 30 days previously or immediately after a booster vaccination and vaccinations have been administered in accordance with licensed rabies vaccine label directions.
- (5) "Licensed rabies vaccine" means a vaccine against rabies for certain species of animals licensed by the United States Department of Agriculture for use in such species and marketed in the United States.
- (6) "Not currently vaccinated" means an animal for which there is no licensed rabies vaccine or an animal for which there is a licensed rabies vaccine but such animal is under the minimum age to be vaccinated against rabies or does not satisfy the requirements of "currently vaccinated" as defined in subdivision (4) of this section.
- (7) "Public setting" means any event, facility or premise at which the public is invited and allowed to have direct physical contact with animals. Public settings include but are not limited to fairs, animal exhibitions, petting zoos, municipal pounds, animal shelters, nature centers, riding stables, pony rides, and educational programs.
- (8) "Rabies" means an infection of the central nervous system of mammals caused by viruses in the Rhabdovirus family that typically results in death.
- (9) "Uncontrolled situation" means a public setting at which persons have direct physical contact with an animal and such persons cannot be readily identified or contacted if a rabies exposure incident occurs.
- (10) "Vaccinated" means an animal was vaccinated against rabies in accordance with licensed rabies vaccine label directions.

Section 22-359-2. Animals for which there is a licensed rabies vaccine. Exceptions.

- (1) No animal for which there is a licensed rabies vaccine may be in a public setting without being currently vaccinated for rabies.
- (2) Animals under the minimum age to be vaccinated, vaccinated animals offered for sale or adoption and animals residing in municipal pounds shall be exempt from the provisions of this section.

Section 22-359-3. Animals not currently vaccinated.

- (1) Written records shall be kept by the owner, keeper, or handler of any animal not currently vaccinated for rabies that is present in a public setting in a controlled situation. The written records shall include contact information for all persons having direct physical contact with such animal, including the names, addresses and telephone numbers of such persons and the date of contact. Such records shall be maintained for a period of six months and shall be made immediately available to the Commissioner upon request.
- (2) Any animal not currently vaccinated for rabies that is present in a public setting in an uncontrolled situation shall be separated from the public by sufficient means to avoid direct contact between people and animals, such as a double fence, plexiglass, or other device to avoid direct contact between people and animals as determined by the Commissioner, or a conspicuous sign shall be posted near the animal enclosure stating "CONNECTICUT RABIES ADVISORY NOTICE DO NOT FEED OR TOUCH ANIMALS".

Section 22-359-4. Exemptions.

(1) Mice, rats, gerbils, hamsters, guinea pigs, and rabbits and any other animal in a public setting considered low risk for rabies transmission by the Commissioner which can be documented as being born and exclusively raised and kept in a manner that prohibits direct physical contact with wildlife are exempt from the provisions of sections 22-359-2 and 22-359-3

of the Regulations of Connecticut State Agencies.

(2) Birds, reptiles and amphibians shall be exempt from the provisions of sections 22-359-2 and 22-359-3 of

the Regulations of Connecticut State Agencies.

(3) Animals which were bred at facilities licensed by the United States Department of Agriculture, and which can be documented as being born and exclusively raised and kept in a manner that prohibits direct physical contact with wildlife, and have at no time been co-mingled with animals that may have had direct physical contact with wildlife, are exempt from the provisions of sections 22-359-2 and 22-359-3 of the Regulations of Connecticut State Agencies.

Section 22-359-5. Penalty.

The Commissioner may impose civil penalties for any violation of the provisions of sections 22-359-2 and 22-359-3 of the Regulations of Connecticut State Agencies in accordance with the provisions of Connecticut General Statutes section 22-7.

THE HISTORY OF THE TERRYVILLE LIONS COUNTRY FAIR

There are people who believe that the old Terryville Fair is somehow related to the Terryville Country Fair that we enjoy each year. It is true that there was a fair in town back before I was born, and the fairgrounds was where the Hoye Street development is now. From what I understand, it probably ended sometime in the 1920's or '30's. I imagine that it was sponsored by the Grange or a local agricultural society.

Fast-forward to 1941 when a new club was formed in town; part of the International Association of Lions Clubs, and sponsored by the Bristol Lions Club. As was the practice for all Service Clubs at the time, the membership consisted of business and professional men; those who could take time off from work (usually at noon) to attend meetings. Of the 22 Charter members, two later became presidents of the Terryville Trust Company, two were clergymen, two were physicians, one was the First Selectman, and one was the funeral director, later to become our club's first District Governor. All the rest were either local businessmen or in management in one or the other of our local industries.

Sometime around 1947 or '48, several members, more than likely led by J. Francis Ryan, who was probably active in that earlier fair, decided that the Terryville Lions Club should sponsor a new fair; naming it the Terryville Country Fair. Plans were laid out, and no doubt help was given by the Association of Connecticut Fairs (Mr. Ryan was active in this group), and a place to hold it was needed. In those days, there were plenty of empty lots available around town, and at some point the club was able to lease the Stashenko property (the old Higgins farm) up on Town Hill.

During the summer of 1949, when I was nine years old, the whole town was talking about the upcoming Terryville Fair. As the time for the fair approached, people would drive up to the fairgrounds to see what was going on. It must be understood that the fairgrounds was nothing more than an open field of about 15 acres. Everything had to be set up in preparation for the fair. Tables had to be constructed, electricity had to be brought in, and tents had to be rented. One thing was already in place in 1949. A hand-dug well was right in the middle of the open field, so the club decided to purchase one acre of land surrounding it. An old garage was brought up from downtown and placed over the well. It was the only permanent structure on the fairgrounds until 1959. The water was not fit for drinking, so any water on the grounds during the fair was drawn from a large tank on the back of a town truck.


I remember being at my Uncle Bill's house on Scott Road and watching the various concessions trucks and trailers carrying Ferris Wheels and Merry-Go-Rounds as they turned up from West Main Street and rattled uphill toward the fairgrounds. The Lions members had plenty of work to do in preparation for the fair; setting up the long display tables, laying out and burying electrical lines and lights, etc. Behind the scenes. tickets had to be printed, and the Premium Book which was filled with information and rules to be followed by exhibitors and patrons of the fair had to be published sometime in June. Also, in those early days, the only revenue taken by the Lions Club was from ticket sales, Premium Book advertising and concessionaire space-rental. Any work to be done inside the tents; lights, tables, etc. had to be accomplished after the tents arrived from Elmira, New York on Monday of the week of the fair. The Lions often worked well after dark, using members' automobile headlights. The days get short in mid-September! The big weekend finally arrived. The Terryville Country Fair had all the items necessary to be in compliance with the state fair association; animal attractions, machinery exhibits, a carnival, rides, a horse show, and a draught-animal pulling show. Interestingly, there were more than twenty farmers in town who raised oxen for pulling heavy weights at these events. This remains a popular feature, drawing both cattle and horses from all over the region. My dad was a supernumerary policeman at the time, and worked at the fair. A horse-show participant broke his leg and Dad helped to get him into Scott's hearse (there was no ambulance) for transport to the hospital.

One of the attractions that I remember of those early days was Nathan Kramer's auction tent. Everybody seemed to end up there at one time or other. He had all kinds of stuff to auction-off; ceramic T.V. lamps, "bronze" horse statues, and trinkets of all kinds. As a kid, I enjoyed visiting Harry Kirkwood's John Deere display. I could buy model John Deere tractors and implements, and even International Harvester truck models. The area automobile dealerships were out in abundance. You could check out the latest models; the new Oldsmobile Rocket V-8; the Chryslers and Plymouths, or

the new Chevrolets. For the "Farmer's Wife" we had full displays of canned goods; pickles, tomatos and peaches; baked goods and quilts. Mid-September was a great time to show your prize fresh vegetables as well.

Once the fair closed on late Sunday afternoon, all the equipment that had been set up by the Lions the five days before the fair had to be taken down before Monday morning when the tent people would be back. The display tables had to be loaded onto a truck to be taken down to Dana Purrington's barn in Pequabuck while another group of Lions had to drive over to Bethlehem with borrowed poultry crates (their fair was the next weekend).

The fair was a success, even though the Lions did not make a tremendous amount of money on it, but it did serve as a great public service activity and helped to put us "on the map". Any activity that relies on the weather also faces some risk. In 1952 there was a total rain-out. My dad was doing traffic duty at the west entrance in pouring rain, and remembered seeing only one car entering the fairgrounds. It was a big black Cadillac carrying Governor John D. Lodge. He had promised that he would attend. Again, in 1956, we had another total rain-out. Josiah Wood and others realized that this might be the end, and called on all our creditors to hold-off for a few months, promising that they would be paid. This saved the fair.

I joined the Lions Club in 1965; much of what the club did prior to that time was still going on; the late night set ups inside the tents, the feverish dismantling of everything on Sunday night, etc. One good thing that happened before I joined was the construction of a plywood building (where the flagpole and Food Building are now located .This was used for storage of tables, screens and table legs for all the months between fairs. There was little room for anything else until the building was emptied out for the fair, when it became the Fair Office. With the construction of our first pole barn, tables and other equipment could be stored there, allowing the plywood building to be used as a place for Fair Meetings, etc. We even added

a stove, sink and refrigerator; giving the Lions a place to relax during the fair and at other events during the year.

The only food on the fairgrounds prior to the fair was provided by an old guy who set up on the corner of the midway on Friday night, "Bob's French Fries" did quite a good business serving the Lions and others while they worked to be ready for the weekend. Once the fair opened, patrons could find food in several locations. The Knights of Columbus sold hot dogs and hamburgers next to Bob's French Fries, the Holt Community Club had a sit-down chicken dinner, and Petey Buck from Bristol did fried-dough pizza. Another vendor, "Art's French Fries" was a fixture at the fair for many years.

The Terryville Lions Club

was making somewhere around five or six thousand dollars a year from the fair by the time I became a member. One night at a meeting at the old Austin House, one of our members, Russell Bondeson, stood up and said that if we want to make a profit at the fair, we'll need to take over the sale of food. The club then notified all the vendors, and we began offering hot dogs, hamburgers, sausage sandwiches, french fries, soda, beer and ice cream novelties. Not long after that, we began our chicken barbecue, Petey Buck stayed on for a few more years. We started to show a decent return for all our hard work.

After several multi-year leases, the Stashenko family offered us the opportunity to purchase the fairgrounds. In 1975, we bought approximately 30 acres; half of which was forest-land. Soon afterward, we contracted with someone to clear-cut the wooded area, and with the Operators' Union to bring in heavy equipment to clear the land while they practiced their trade. These two things doubled the size of the fairgrounds; giving us about 15 acres for parking. Over the years, successive purchases of contiguous parcels have greatly improved parking, fireworks placement, etc.

With ownership of the land, the Lions Club was free to build additional structures on it. Around the same time, the Andrew Terry Company asked if we would be interested in taking down a warehouse full of wooden racks and shelves. The club took them up on this, and ended up with enough lumber (mostly 2X4's) to nearly fill the first storage/display building.

From this, many structures were built; the original food booth, pizza booth, chicken barbecue pavilion, and pig barn. These buildings have by now all been replaced, but they served us well for at least forty years.

The wives and girlfriends of Lions members were a part of the fair since its beginning. Some helped out with judging exhibits, some worked in the Secretary's office and others simply supported their men. The club's "thanks" to them consisted of a "Ladies Nite" dinner dance in November, When the Lions finally took over the food sales at the fair, Wednesday nights before the fair saw a whole crew of women working in the small kitchen in the plywood "headquarters". They cut and peeled onions and peppers and cooked them in prepa-

ration to be served alongside the hot dogs, hamburgs and sausage sandwiches at the fair. The whole place smelled like onions for the rest of the week. Once the fair began, they worked side-by-side with the Lions in the food booth; frying hamburgers, sausage sandwiches, and hot dogs, and slicing rolls. They also waited on the long lines of hungry fairgoers.

Seventy years after its founding, in 1987, the International Association of Lions Clubs finally accepted women into full membership. Today, they provide the same services to their local clubs and communities as their male counterparts; rising through the ranks even to the highest levels of Lion ism, including International President. We here in Terryville salute our female members for their service. Our club and our community would not be the same without them.





Each year The Association of Connecticut Fairs sponsors baking contests open to the public at participating member fairs. There are separate contests for Junior and Adult divisions, each with a specific recipe. A Two-Crusted Apple Pie Baking contest is also held.

WHO MAY ENTER: The contest at each participating member fair is open to all men, women and juniors. Commercial, industrial or professional bakers are not eligible. Divisions: Juniors (ages 7 to 15 as of July 1st) and Adult.

HOW TO ENTER: All men, women or juniors entering a contest at any participating member fair is automatically entered and competing in the local contest. Contestants may enter the contest at as many fairs as they wish until they win first prize. They will then represent that fair at the state baking contest. Please submit entries to both the local and state contest on disposable plates. The Association of Connecticut Fairs and the member fairs are not responsible for the return of plates, trays or containers.

JUDGING: Judging will be based on appearance, flavor and texture. The Association of Connecticut Fairs will furnish judges' score sheets to each fair and the contestant will receive these sheets at the end of the contest. Additions, deletions or substitutions in the recipe are not permitted and will result in disqualification. All decisions of the judges are final.

LOCAL CONTEST: The winner of the local contest will receive a blue ribbon from the Association of Connecticut Fairs and will then become eligible to submit their entry at the state contest. In the event that only one entry is received at the local contest and that entry is worthy of first prize, that entry must be awarded the first place ribbon.

INGREDIENTS:

Dough:

3 cups King Arthur Baking Company All-Purpose flour

2 teaspoons instant yeast

1 1/4 teaspoons salt

1 large egg

1/2 cup milk, lukewarm

1/4 cup water, lukewarm

3 tablespoons olive oil

Filling:

1/2 cup shredded Fontina cheese

1/4 cup shredded Parmesan cheese

1/2 cup oil-packed sun-dried tomatoes

3 garlic cloves, peeled and minced

1 ½ tablespoons dried basil



- 1. To make the dough: Measure the flour and gently spoon it into a cup, then sweep off any excess. Combine all of the dough ingredients in a bowl, then mix and knead to make a smooth, very soft dough.
- 2. Place the dough in a lightly greased bowl, cover, and let it rise until it's doubled in size, about 45 to 60 minutes.
- 3. Meanwhile, thoroughly drain the tomatoes, patting them dry. Use kitchen shears or a sharp knife to cut them into smaller bits.
- 4. Place the dough on a lightly floured surface and pat or roll into a 22" x 8 1/2" rectangle, deflating it slightly. Spread with the cheese, tomatoes, garlic, and basil.
- Starting with one long edge, roll the dough into a log the long way. Pinch the edges to seal. Place the log seam-side down on a lightly greased or parchment-lined baking sheet.
- 6. Using kitchen shears, start 1/2" from one end and cut the log lengthwise down the center about 1" deep, to within 1/2" of the other end.
- 7. Keeping the cut side up, form an "S" shape. Tuck both ends under the center of the "S" to form a "figure 8;" pinch the ends together to seal. When shaping the loaf, tuck any larger pieces of tomato or basil down into the dough (to avoid char).
- 8. Cover and let rise in a warm place until double, 45 to 60 minutes.
- 9. While the loaf is rising, preheat the oven to 350°F.
- 10. Uncover the bread, and bake it for 35 to 40 minutes, tenting it with foil after 20 to 25 minutes to prevent over-browning.
- 11. Remove the bread from the oven and transfer it to a rack to cool.

Submit on foil-covered cardboard no wider than one inch from the bread.

For the cake:

3/4 cup white sugar

1/4 cup butter

1 egg

2 teaspoons lemon zest

1 1/2 cups plus 1 tablespoon King Arthur Baking All-Purpose flour, divided

2 teaspoons baking powder

Vermont Whole Wheat Oatmeal Honey Bread

Made from a combination of all-purpose flour, oats, and whole wheat, this is a great American-style sandwich bread: high-rising, soft-textured, and mildly sweet. From the classic PB&J sandwich to grilled cheese to your everyday breakfast toast, this versatile loaf is a real crowd-pleaser.

PREP: 10 mins • BAKE: 35 to 40 mins • TOTAL: 4 hrs 30 mins YIELD: 2 Loaves

INGREDIENTS:

2 cups (454g) boiling water

1 cup (89g) rolled oats, old-fashioned or quick-cooking

1/2 cup (78g) maple sugar or 1/2 cup (106g) brown sugar, packed

1 tablespoon (21g) honey

4 tablespoons (57g) butter

2 1/2 teaspoons (15g) salt

1 teaspoon cinnamon, Vietnamese preferred

1 tablespoon instant yeast

1 1/2 cups (170g) King Arthur White Whole Wheat Flour

4 cups (480g) King Arthur Unbleached All-Purpose Flour

INSTRUCTIONS

- 1. In a large mixing bowl, combine the water, oats, maple or brown sugar, honey, butter, salt, and cinnamon. Let cool to lukewarm (100°F to 110°F), which typically takes about 10 to 15 minutes; stir the mixture several times to help things along, if you like.
- 2. Weigh your flour; or measure it by gently spooning it into a cup, then sweeping off any excess. Add the yeast and flours, stirring to form a rough dough. Knead (about 10 minutes by hand, 5 to 7 minutes by machine) until the dough is smooth and satiny.
- 3. Transfer the dough to a lightly greased bowl, cover the bowl with lightly greased plastic wrap, and allow the dough to rise for 1 hour. Since the dough is warm to begin with (from the boiling water), it should become quite puffy.
- 4. Divide the dough in half, and shape each half into a loaf. Place the loaves in two greased $8\ 1/2" \times 4\ 1/2"$ bread pans.
- 5. Cover the pans with lightly greased plastic wrap and allow the loaves to rise until they've crowned about 1" over the rim of the pan, about 1 to 2 hours.
- 6. Bake the loaves in a preheated 350°F oven for 35 to 40 minutes, tenting them lightly with aluminum foil after 25 minutes, to prevent over-browning. Remove them from the oven when they're golden brown, and the interior registers 190°F on a digital thermometer.
- 7. Turn the loaves out onto a rack to cool. Store at room temperature, well-wrapped, for several days; freeze for longer storage.

DOUGHNUT MUFFINS

This basic muffin is not your stir-it-gently, dense, fruit-and-nut-filled health muffin. Instead, it's a beat-it-up, cake-type muffin, high-crowned and very "vanilla-looking." This is a great muffin for kids (young or old) who don't want a lot of "stuff" in their muffins. With its basic sugar-cinnamon-nutmeg flavor, it's more reminiscent of a plain doughnut (without the deep-fat frying) than anything else.

As plain as it is (which is just the way some people like things), it's a good candidate for additions of dried fruit and/or nuts to the batter, as well as a garnish of flavorful jam or preserves when serving time rolls around.

PREP: 10 mins • BAKE: 15 to 17 mins • TOTAL: 25 mins YIELD: 12 muffins

INGREDIENTS:

Batter

4 tablespoons (57g) butter

1/4 cup (50g) vegetable oil

1/2 cup (99g) granulated sugar*

1/3 cup (71g) light brown sugar or dark brown sugar, packed*

2 large eggs

1 1/2 teaspoons baking powder

1/4 teaspoon baking soda

1 to 1 1/4 teaspoons nutmeg, to taste

3/4 teaspoon salt

1 teaspoon King Arthur Pure Vanilla Extract

2 2/3 cups (320g) King Arthur Unbleached All-Purpose Flour

1 cup (227g) milk

TOPPING:

3 tablespoons (43g) butter, melted

3 tablespoons (39g) cinnamon sugar

INSTRUCTIONS:

- 1. Preheat the oven to 425°F. Lightly grease a standard muffin tin. Or line with 12 paper or silicone muffin cups, and grease the cups with non-stick vegetable oil spray; this will ensure that they peel off the muffins nicely.
- In a medium-sized mixing bowl, cream together the butter, vegetable oil, and sugars till smooth.
- 3. Add the eggs, beating to combine.
- 4. Stir in the baking powder, baking soda, nutmeg, salt, and vanilla.
- Stir the flour into the butter mixture alternately with the milk, beginning and ending with the flour and making sure everything is thoroughly combined.
- Spoon the batter evenly into the prepared pan, filling the cups nearly full
- Bake the muffins for 15 to 17 minutes, or until they're a pale golden brown and a cake tester inserted into the middle of one of the center muffins comes out clean.
- 8. Remove them from the oven, and let them cool for a couple of minutes, or until you can handle them. While they're cooling, melt the butter for the topping (this is easily done in the microwave).
- 9. Use a pastry brush to paint the top of each muffin with the butter, then sprinkle with the cinnamon sugar. Or simply dip the tops of muffins into the melted butter, then roll in the cinnamon sugar.
- 10. Serve warm, or cool on a rack and wrap airtight. Store for a day or so at room temperature.


